Hawaii's Plantation Village once again opens the Oahu bon dance season with its annual Obon Celebration. Join us for a fun night of dancing, ono local foods and tasty treats such as andagi, shave ice and waffle dogs. The Village Gift Shop, Country Store and pop-up plant sales tent will offer a variety of plantation related items and crafts for purchase and visitors can also visit our Historical Exhibition Room to learn about Hawaii's plantation life, the Honouliuli National Historic Site and view our Looking Through Our Grandparent' Closet exhibit.

This year's celebration will once again feature 10 bon dance groups from all over Oahu.

Executive Director Report

Since the last newsletter, there has been an effort to increase and diversify Hawaii's Plantation Village programming. Besides the February 1st, New Year Celebration, there was the insightful and at times emotional March 15th panel, *Reflections of Our Journey in Hong Kong Hong and Zhongshan: Home of Hawaii's early Chinese Plantation Workers*, and the excellent presentation by Dr. Sharleen Nakamoto Levine, *Japanese and Filipino Women's Pregnancy and Childbirth Ways: Hawaii's Sugar Plantations, Early to Mid-20th Century*. The most recent program was the April 26th *Poetry Reading and Writing Workshop* which was in partnership with the National Park Service for the Honouliuli National Historic Site 10 Year Celebration.

Besides the partnership with the National Park Service, another community partner is the Filipino Community Center. We are in preliminary discussions regarding collaborative projects with the Fil Com Center.

On May 8th, HPV will host a one-day conference *Hawaii Museum and Ethnic Historical Societies* in which 15 historical based societies will meet to share information which will enhance future cooperative endeavors. The conference keynote speaker will be Dr. Theodore Gonzalves who is a curator at the Smithsonian Asian Pacific Center in Washington DC.

The next day on May 9^{th} from 12:30 p.m. -3:30 p.m. will be the HPV sponsored event *THE GIFT OF MY ROOTS: Sharing and Preserving Chuukese and Marshallese Stories*. This event will be a celebration of Chuukese and Marshallese books, dances, songs, weaving, storytelling, and artifact displays.

Last, I am happy to share that we will be making the SheTour — our plantation women's history tour—an ongoing HPV offering each Tuesday at 11:00 a.m. During March's Women's History Month, demand for the tour started to build and has continued into the end of April, with dozens of visitors and multiple workplace offices booking the tour as a group excursion.

I hope to see you at our next events.



Nabera, Hechima, Cucumber Gourd Cucumis sativus

The young, immature nabera fruits, are edible and can be eaten raw, pickled or cooked. It is a typical Okinawan summer vegetable with a sponge like consistency, commonly served simmered in miso and used in soups. The fully matured and dried fruit transform into a natural sponge. The luffa sponge, is very soft, flexible and easy on the skin when soaked in water. The fibers are extremely tough and can be used to scrub pots and pans.

Remembering Barbara Kawakami

Barbara Fusako Kawakami, 103, passed away on December 20, 2024, in Mililani. After a 38-year career as a dressmaker, she pursued higher education at age 52, earning a BS in Fashion Design and an MA in Asian Studies at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa.

In 1993, she published Japanese Immigrant Clothing in Hawaii, 1885-1941, by UH Press. In 2012, Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii recognized her as a "Living Treasure of Hawaii." In 2016, she published Picture Bride Stories, by UH Press which won the Asian-Pacific American Award for Literature in Non-Fiction. In 2019, she received the "Order of the Rising Sun, Silver Rays" at the Imperial Palace.

She is predeceased by her husband Douglas in 2001, son Steven in 2017, and is survived by daughter Fay (Ivan) Toyama, son Gary (Brigitte) Kawakami, 5 grandchildren and 6 great-grandchildren.

Memorial services were held on Friday, April 18, 2025, at Mililani Memorial Park.

Some years ago, Barbara assisted Hawaii's Plantation Village in identifying kimono including several from 1898. HPV also hosted a book signing event for her first publication.
