He fought in World War II in the U.S. Army's 1st Filipino Infantry Regiment and was part of the production of *An Untold Triumph: America's Filipino Soldiers*.



New Book by Barbara Kawakami

A previous Hawaii's Plantation Village Legacy awardee, **Barbara Kawakami** has released a new book titled *Picture Bride Stories*. In this book she chronicled the lives of 16 actual picture brides who came to Hawaii from Japan in the early 1900's to marry Japanese men who had immigrated to work in the cane fields of the islands. Barbara Kawakami (nee Oyama) was born in Japan in 1921 and immigrated to Hawaii when she was 3 months old. She learned to sew at a young age and for 38 years was a dressmaker while married and raising 3 children. At age 53 she entered college and earned a degree in Fashion Design & Merchandizing and later an MA in Asian Studies. Barbara has been a researcher, writer, and consultant for a number of projects including the film "Picture Bride" released by Miramax Pictures in 1994. Her award winning book "Japanese Immigrant Clothing in Hawaii" 1885-1941", was published in 1993.
